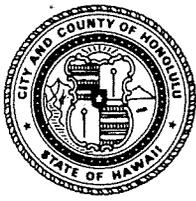

Committee Chair Martin announced that he had called for another meeting of the Legislative Matters Committee to consider Resolution 12-322, authorizing the filing of an application and execution of a Full Funding Grant Agreement with the Federal Transit Administration on Thursday, November 29, 2012, at 2:30 p.m. The Resolution was initially posted on an Addendum for today's committee meeting but due to the fact that Councilmember-Elect Carol Fukunaga would be sworn in on November 27, 2012, he wanted to afford her the opportunity to participate in the hearing and to vote on the measure. This would ensure representation from all nine Council districts.

Acting Director Jiro Sumada reported that the Department supported the Resolution which would delete the existing park symbol from the Waianae PIM for the proposed Nanakuli Regional Park project, for reasons detailed in Communication D-727.

Acting Director Jiro Sumada of DPP addressed Committee Members' concerns by providing the following information:

- The Waianae SCP that was approved established a requirement for a regional park but it did not have a location on the exhibit map. The City's PIM did have a location, blue spot, for a regional park.
- Removal of the park symbol, blue spot, from the Waianae SCP had no bearing on the park symbol that existed on the PIM. A symbol on the PIM is to pursue a CIP project for projected future growth.
- Sustainable communities plans and development plans are merely planning documents to be used as guidelines.
- For the record, the Council could legally move forward with a park at the proposed site with or without the designation on the Waianae SCP.

Director Gary Cabato of DPR addressed Committee Members' concerns by providing the following information:

- In the past two years, the DPR has done careful prioritization of its monies, especially for renovation of its existing parks.
- Monies for a full-time groundskeeper had been appropriated for Oneula Park.
- If the park symbol remained on the PIM, the earliest the 50-acre park could be developed would be sometime after six years, in the year 2019, and provided that the City was financially solvent.
- The total acreage for the Central Oahu Regional Park was 500-plus.
- The best gauge for cost of construction of the 50-acre parcel would probably be \$5.2 million for 10 acres and the equivalent ratio would be five times that amount. Also, there was added cost for staffing and equipment.

Committee Chair Martin recommended that Resolution 12-139 be reported out for adoption.

Committee Member Berg stated that the Resolution should be deferred to afford the people of Nanakuli the opportunity to address their concerns on the removal of the park symbol for the proposed Nanakuli Regional Park.

Committee Members Garcia and Harimoto both stated that they supported the Chair's recommendation to report Resolution 12-139 out for adoption.

Committee Member Kobayashi stated that the issue was not a question of denying the people of Nanakuli a park but rather finding a suitable area for it. She further stated that private lands should not be condemned for the development of parks.

Committee Member Chang stated that he would be supporting the Resolution with reservations as he felt there was not sufficient information to definitively decide on the removal of the park symbol for the proposed Nanakuli Regional Park but he was sympathetic to the people of Nanakuli.

Committee Member Anderson stated that he would be voting in opposition to moving the Resolution forward based on: (1) hearing from the people who had requested that a PIM symbol for a park be placed on the property owned by PVT; and (2) being extremely concerned about the health and safety of the Nanakuli residents who were situated next to the existing PVT landfill and the possible expansion of the landfill by PVT.

Committee Chair Martin stated that eminent domain powers should be done judiciously and with extreme caution. He further stated that: (1) he and his colleagues would love to see a regional park in that community but realistically the City could not afford it; (2) the Governor was open to leasing the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands' parcels for the development of a park and had directed the chairperson of that Department to explore that possibility; and (3) perhaps looking into the possibilities of private parties who would be willing to financially contribute toward development of the park.

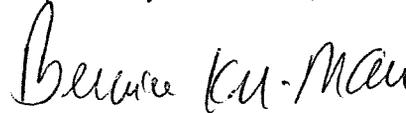

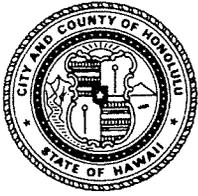

Director and CEO Grabauskus and Grants Manager Phyllis Kurio of HART both addressed Committee Members' questions by providing the following information:

- Attachment 5 of the FFGA showed funds that had been awarded: 5309 New Starts funds of \$34,990,000 and \$30 million; and American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds of \$4 million.
- Fifty-Five million dollars have been appropriated in Federal Fiscal Year 2011 and would be forthcoming.
- Attachment 6 of the FFGA showed 5307 funds which might be used in later years. HART thus far was able to advance the rail project with resources from the General Excise Tax and some of the Federal funds.
- If Federal money was expended and for whatever reason the rail project was abandoned, there would be a likelihood that the City would have to return the \$1.55 billion.
- The FFGA is basically a contract between Congress and any jurisdiction. Further, never in its history had Congress not fully funded a FFGA and, therefore, once signed, the City would be front in line in terms of having Congress fulfill that obligation.
- Many members of Congress are surprisingly familiar with the rail project, which they reviewed favorably.

Committee Chair Martin recommended that Resolution 12-322 be reported out for adoption.

Committee Member Berg stated that he was in opposition to the Resolution as steel-wheel on steel-rail is the most archaic and expensive product in contrast to other viable modes of transportation systems such as the Maglev. He further stated that the \$1.55 billion from the Federal government was not free money but tax dollars that could be spent much more appropriately.

Committee Member Harimoto expressed his strongest support for Committee Chair Martin's recommendation in reporting out the Resolution for adoption. He stated that the rail was absolutely essential for the future of Honolulu.

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Committee Member Kobayashi stated that she would be supporting the Resolution but with reservations. She further stated that initially she was in favor of the rail and thought it would help the traffic problems in Ewa Beach and Waianae but now felt that it was the wrong technology and buses would better service those communities.

Committee Member Garcia disclosed that he filed a Disclosure of Interest Statement, Communication CC-354. He outlined the City's lengthy rail history from its inception to the present; and finally, although tired, he was glad that the vote would soon be taken.

Committee Member Anderson stated that his support for a mass transit system was always contingent upon receiving Federal funding via an FFGA. He looks forward to continuing to work with everyone to better the City for all of its residents.

Committee Chair Martin thanked everyone for their participation on the committee and for asking the tough questions. He stated that his position on rail had never wavered and his actions dictated his stand on this particular project.

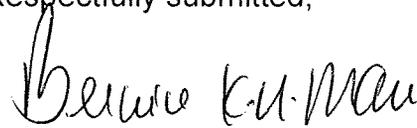

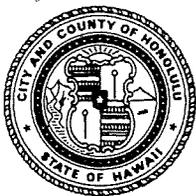

7.    BILL 57 (2012), FD1

RELATING TO ANIMAL CONTROL LAWS. Amending portions of the animal control law by adding a new "Section 3.5.\_\_\_\_ - Humane destruction of animals – Public notification requirements" and adding new definitions of "Agent" and "Animal".

The following amendment was posted on the agenda:

PROPOSED CD1 TO BILL 57 (2012), FD1 – The CD1 (OCS/112012/03:40/YL) makes the following amendments:

- A.    Requires that the animal control contractor provide the following information to non-profit animal sheltering agencies and rescue groups upon request:
  - 1.    The date and time the animal is to be humanely destroyed;
  - 2.    The type, breed (if known), name (if any), weight, sex and medical status of the animal;
  - 3.    A photograph of the animal; and
  - 4.    Any other information required by the City by contract.

- C.    Clarifies that information about animals not available for adoption is not required.

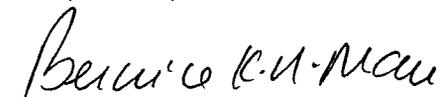

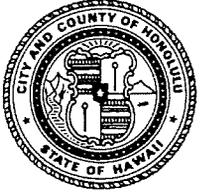

### OPENING REMARKS

Committee Chair Garcia welcomed everyone and thanked Representative Aquino and Senator Espero for their participation so that together they could address disaster preparedness, response, recovery, and resiliency in light of the recent tsunami warnings and evacuations in Hawaii and the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy that devastated the Northeastern United States.

- Planning for recovery and resiliency.
- Community engagement in the discussion to foster better understanding on all sides.

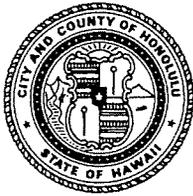

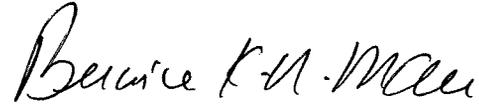
