







## ANNUAL REPORT

### Board of Public Parks and Recreation City and County of Honolulu

1951

#### Administrative and Fiscal

The year 1951 saw a tapering off of the large postwar construction program which, underway since 1947, was financed largely by the bond issue authorized that year by the legislature (\$2,300,000). The year also saw the completion of the first half of the ten-year renovation and construction program which had been drawn up during the war. It is gratifying to report that in this first half, every area which was deteriorated during the war has been restored. And in addition that most playgrounds have received major improvements. Nightlights, new playing courts, new equipment, sometimes new pavilions, backstops and bleachers are now found in most of them.

Moreover, an impressive list of entirely new facilities has been completed. Large new playfields on both sides of the city, smaller playgrounds, gymnasiums, community centers, swimming pools, as well as fine beach developments are now a part of the city and county park system.

Keeping pace with this enlarged plant during the early part of the period was a corresponding expansion in maintenance and in the recreation program. As new areas were opened, they were placed under the leadership of trained staff members who set up full length programs. At the same time older recreation units had their programs broadened to include new segments of the population.

In 1951, however, both maintenance and recreation expansion came to a full stop. In fact, both were curtailed in a number of ways. The addition of unit after unit obviously requires additional personnel for operation and maintenance. From 1948 to 1950 this had been met partly by new positions, but mostly by drawing away personnel from one established unit after the other. This left a skeleton staff and opened the new units in equally attenuated forms. During 1951, however, this stretching reached its limit and holes began to appear.

The number of new positions needed to operate properly and maintain the new fields, buildings and centers has, since 1948, accumulated to 94. Yet the number of new positions allowed in the 1951 budget was just ONE, for maintenance and NONE for recreation. Unless the necessary new positions can be created and filled shortly there must come a marked retrogression in this Board's program. No organization can stand still.

This Board believes that to spend several millions of dollars of public funds for development and improvement and not to provide adequately for their proper maintenance, upkeep and operation is contrary to sound public practice.

Construction and Planning Division

While the peak of postwar developments was reached in 1950, with more projects in the stages of planning, construction or completion than at any other time, 1951, nevertheless, saw some important work accomplished by this division.

Over twenty playgrounds and parks had additions made to them.

Among single large projects was the Ala Wai Clubhouse which was renovated and reopened for public use after having served as an armed forces club for some years.

For the first time since the war, one major project was devoted exclusively to beautification. This was the planting of an oriental style garden in the deteriorated end of Ala Moana Park.

Acquisitions included Aiea Recreation Center and Gymnasium, Aina Haina Playground, Puuloa Beach Park and various additions to existing parks.

## Maintenance Division

While these large new projects were completed, no comparable enlargement of the maintenance forces has been made. To care for the new areas, the staff of one older project after the other has had to be reduced by calling some of its personnel to form a staff for the new facilities. The addition of some mechanized equipment and close organization for efficiency has made it possible to prevent visible deterioration in park maintenance. But much that should have been done has had to be omitted.

## Honolulu Zoo

This important unit has grown during the past year with the hoofed animal area filled with such new beasts as zebras, bison and African antelope. A new refreshment center and a comfort station were half completed as the year ended. These will allow the old concession building to be removed, greatly increasing the spacious attractiveness of the Zoo grounds. New water mains, basic to the whole development of the grounds and exhibits were also installed. Attendance during the year was 513,577.

## Recreation Division

Like Maintenance this division has found its staff stretched to a point where serious impairment of programs will be inevitable unless relief is soon forthcoming. With the new areas completed and no additions to the staff, only the shifting of personnel has made it possible for leadership services to continue. In some small areas in spite of this, leadership has had to be completely removed. This has resulted in an alarming disturbance in the attitude of people.

But for the willingness of volunteer leaders (who are always an important part of any recreation service) even more alarming reactions and results would have been inevitable. Primarily through these volunteers, the paid staff leadership has been able to continue its high degree of standards and hold to its statistical results.

Several million people participated during the year in the enjoyment of the facilities operated by this Board. There is no way of counting all those who picnicked, camped, swam or fished on the public beach parks. But some idea of this number may be gained by the total number, estimated daily, on the beaches patrolled by life guards. These men work chiefly in the Waikiki area and in this section their estimate was that 2,744,297 people came under their survey.

Other uncounted thousands simply visited the parks, many hundreds of visitors concentrating particularly on Foster Garden.

Other thousands of youngsters used the playgrounds for free play in addition to those who took part in the planned programs.

By actual count participants in planned activities in the city areas were 816,258, and in the rural areas 266,053, making a total of over one million. Spectators at games, shows, festivals and other such events are believed by careful estimation to have been over three hundred thousand. In specialized activities there were 21,448 participating in hula and music; 2,384 studied lauhala weaving, while 6,397 participated in tennis activities (in addition to those who used the courts for free play).

Of the recreation facilities operated, thirty-six are playgrounds with leadership, seven are play areas maintained without leadership, and six are as yet undeveloped fields. Community and recreation centers number twelve. There are twenty-two miscellaneous recreation units including the golf practice course, rifle range, three gymnasiums, two camps, two public clubhouses and two scenic lookouts for motorists. The nature of these miscellaneous facilities indicates the trend toward including adults in the recreation program.

#### Properties

At the end of 1951 this Board had under its control and management some 2000 acres of land. These areas, with the various buildings and other installations, have been divided for convenience into 162 units which are geographical, recreation or administrative in form.

Nineteen of the 162 come within the usual definition of a park square or garden (exclusive of playgrounds). Such parks range in size from the 1200 acre Koko Head Natural Park to small areas such as Thomas Square.

Twenty-nine beach parks rim the island. Some are just as nature made them, others are fully developed with comfort stations, camping, fishing and picnicking facilities.

Among the 162 units are twenty-five traffic adjuncts, including three boulevard parkways and many small circles and triangles at intersections.

Eighty-four units are recreational in nature, divided as indicated under that report above.

Three units are administrative, including the service center and annex, the plant nursery and the downtown office.

The complete listing of the 162 units, with their locations and acreages follow. In this listing they are grouped into parks, squares and gardens; beach parks, traffic adjuncts, administrative units and recreational facilities. The latter are further subdivided according to usage.
