

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



First; the continued support of the Federal Government in supplying recreation leaders through the W. P. A., and N. Y. A.


Second; the acquiring, building, or improving of ten recreation areas as listed in this report by our Superintendent.

## RECREATION HIGHLIGHTS OF 1939

Your Superintendent herewith presents to the Honorable Mayor Charles S. Crane (six years Recreation Commissioner) and Board of Supervisors and the Recreation Commission a brief summary of recreation lights of 1939. This procedure complies with Ordinance # 677.

Detailed reports of finances and activities are found elsewhere which indicate, in general, the advances made in recreation during 1939.

The Playground Directors' Association shoulders the burden of most of the recreation activities, of which there were over 100 during 1939. There were 58 City and County workers and to the Federal Government, there were 29 W. P. A. workers and 26 N. Y. A. student assistants or a total staff of 93.

It was unfortunate that the Recreation Commission's budget for 1939 did not materialize and little hope is seen for it being augmented for 1940. The position of Director of Dramatics however was created.

### Playgrounds and Parks opened during 1939:

1. John M. Asing Park at Honiuliuli; April 9th  
(Built by Road Department).
2. Waiialua Park at Haleiwa; October 22nd.  
(Built by Park Board)
3. Auwaiolimu Playground; November 14th.  
(Built by Public Works Department).

### Improvements Made to Recreation Facilities during 1939:

1. Installation of lights at Dole Playground.
2. Installation of lights at Crane Playground.
3. Installation of lights and improvements at George F. Wright Playground, Wahiawa.
4. Auwaiolimu Playground and pavilion rebuilt from old Bingham Playground with lights added.
5. Repairs at Kawaiahao Recreation Center made.
6. Playground apparatus provided for Papakolea.
7. Extension of fences and backstops made at Miller and Auwaiolimu Playgrounds.
8. Kapiolani Playground made over by Park Board.
9. Judd and Liliha and Middle and Kamehameha IV Road (Police Department)

10. Pacheco Park (Park Board)

11. Move to acquire Moiliili Park by Park Board.

### Training Courses

Fifty-six took part in the 14th annual Recreation Training Course specializing in Games and Officiating for five (5) sessions of three hours each.

The Elementary Swimming Course for teachers enrolled thirty-five members. Twenty-five were given certificates at the completion of the course.

### The Citywide Athletic Association

The Association (which represents the "cream of the crop" of our athletes and boasts the largest A. A.-U. membership participating in more ~~sports than any other club~~) experienced a most successful year placing high in all Hawaiian championships.

### Publicity

Excellent newspaper and radio publicity for all recreation activities was maintained weekly.

### Innovations of 1939

1. List of over 100 Recreation Commission classified activities mimeographed and made available to over 200 inquirers or visitors.
2. Detailed year's activities contained in monthly "Playground News" now in ninth year .
3. More material assistance given Community Associations of Oahu.
4. Greater understanding, appreciation, and assistance of existing welfare groups concerning recreation necessities. Example Kalihi Study.
5. Equipment assistance to Salvation Army recreation centers slightly augmented.
6. Establishment of Civil Service.
7. Establishment of Bureau of Purchases and Supplies.
8. Alexander Joy Cartwright Memorial held locally and nationally - June 11 - and placement of plaque in City Hall patio.

### Miscellaneous This and That

There are only 175 copies of the 164 page book "A History of Recreation in Hawaii" published by the Recreation Commission.

Our annual report is sent to the National Recreation office together with Year Book information.

Three of our directors made "mainland" trips; Martin "Timo" Phillips, Mrs. Thelma Wicke, and Mrs. Amelia Guerrero.

Walter May, member of the National Recreation Board, visited Hawaii.

The Recreation Commission's office, room 601, Honolulu Hale, is headquarters for the Hawaiian Association Amateur Athletic Union; Playground Directors' Association; Citywide Leaders' Association; Citywide Athletic Association; Hawaii Surfing Association; Oahu Amateur Radio Club; Cruising Club of Hawaii; Junior Republic; Waialua, Wahiawa and Windward Oahu Community Associations.

The Territorial Planning Board's reports and supplements on recreation facilities and other related subjects are especially noteworthy.

Mrs. Bess Scobie, principal of Aliiolani School, has attended one year of monthly meetings as Recreation Commissioner.

4. Renovate Kalihiwaena Park.
5. More improved night lighted areas:
  - a. Kaimuki Park.
  - b. Kauluwela.
  - c. Kalakaua.
6. Acquire more and light tennis courts with meter systems.
7. Erection of more buildings at Waimanalo Playground Camp.
8. Place the following under the jurisdiction of Park Board:
  - a. Kauluwela
  - b. Nanakuli
  - c. Damon Park (close "R" Street)
9. Set aside and provide facilities for Parker Park, Waikiki for adult recreation.

11. Build two walks - 50 yards apart - for open water swimming on beach at Waialua Park.
12. Secure assistance for conducting Backyard Playground Campaign .

14. Recreation courses at University of Hawaii and volunteer practice teaching on Playgrounds through Dr. Knox.

## ACTIVITIES OF THE PLAYGROUNDS:

### STORY TELLING

A total of 11585 individuals from playgrounds and institutions heard stories told by Mrs. Bart Adams (Aloha) Tower. The following institutions are on her schedule: Shriners' Hospital, Susannah Wesley Home, Salvation Army Boys' Home, Salvation Army Girls' Home, Salvation Army Women's Home, Kalihi Receiving Station, Kalihi Orphanage; Territorial Blind School, Ala Moana School, Keahi Home, Lunalilo Home, Detention Home, Saint Mary's Mission; King's Daughters Home, Kailua School, Waimanalo School, Kaneohe School and Kaloaloe School.

### TRANSPORTATION

21617 children were transported on the playground truck, averaging 1800 a month. Last year 20,375 children were transported.

### CITYWIDE LEADERS' ASSOCIATION

The Citywide Leaders' Association completed its eighth year of organization and monthly meetings with a total of 159 participating during 1939. Many enjoyable socials, picnics and hikes were held by the Leaders as part of their year's program.

### ATHLETIC PERMITS

Athletic permits issued during the year 1939 totalled 483 permits. 244 of these were for baseball practice and baseball league games ; 194 for softball, football 34; basketball 6; volleyball 2, soccer 1; Tennis and Play Day.

Lack of baseball diamonds was keenly felt. At the present time only nine baseball diamonds are available. The addition of three more diamonds now being made at the Ala Wai near the Boathouse will help to relieve the demands for baseball permits.
